#### PAID PARENTAL LEAVE

Talking to mums in my electorate of Corangamite, they said expanding paid parental leave to 26 weeks would make a difference and advance gender equality.

I recently met up with some of my youngest constituents of the Surf Coast Shire and their parents at the Geelong Multiple Birth Playgroup.

Playgroup secretary Jemma Smith, the mother of one-year-old twins, said the changes to paid parental leave would have made a huge difference to her life when her boys, Angus and Charlie, were born.

Once it passes Parliament, increasing the length of the payment from 20 to 26 weeks will ease the cost-of-living pressures for young families like Jemma's and, importantly, create greater capacity for parents to share parenting, build a career and earn a pay packet.



# COST-OF-LIVING

The Albanese Government's number one priority remains addressing the inflation and cost-of-living challenge.

We know a lot of people are doing it tough. That's why we are delivering \$23 billion in targeted relief, while not adding to inflation.

This includes, energy bill relief, making medicines cheaper, making it easier to see a doctor, cheaper child care, building more social and affordable homes, fee-free TAFE and wages rising at the fastest rate for a decade.

We're also making it harder for foreign investors to buy property in Australia and have introduced our 'Help to Buy' scheme to Parliament which will mean some home buyers only need a two percent deposit to buy a house.

We have done all this at the same time as we've delivered the first budget surplus in 15 years.





As a former teacher, I understand both the importance and challenges of working in education.

Recent surveys show most teachers do not think what they do is valued by the community. We need to change that.

We need to ensure more young Australians want to be a teacher and, that they stay in the profession.

That is why our government launched a new television campaign to raise the status of teachers across the country.

Part of this campaign is to build a workforce, but we also understand incentives help.

So, from next year Commonwealth teacher scholarships worth up to \$40,000 will be available to 5000 students, because teachers matter when it comes to giving our children the best start to life.





More than 50 of Australia's top politicians joined world tour surfing competitors, Paralympians and industry experts to launch Australia's first Parliamentary Friends of Surfing group at Parliament House in Canberra.

The Parliamentary Friends of Surfing Group will promote surfing and raise awareness about the importance of surfing to our economy, to local jobs and to our culture.

Among those in attendance was 2024 WSL world tour athlete and Jan Juc local India Robinson, Surfers for Climate co-founder Belinda Baggs and Surfing Australia CEO Chris Mater.

Surfing Australia highlighted key goals for the sport over the next decade, including the opportunity to host the ISA World Surfing Games for five consecutive years (2025 – 2029).



## **NEW AQUATIC CENTRES**

The North Bellarine Aquatic Centre (Stage One) is now officially open - thanks to \$10 million from the Federal Government and \$5.5 million from the City of Greater Geelong.

And we will soon begin Stage Two - a \$40 million world class indoor aquatic complex - a joint commitment of Federal and State governments. The facility will include an eight-lane 25-metre heated pool, warm water pool for exercise and learn to swim, cafe, gymnasium, and, group exercise studio.

The Torquay pool is also on track - thanks to \$20 million from the Federal Government, \$13 million from the State Government and \$9.8million from the Surf Coast Shire council.

It will include an indoor 25-metre pool for swimming lessons and another warm water pool for exercise classes and hydrotherapy, gym, cafe, allied health suites and amenities.

Torquay pool construction is earmarked for a mid-2024 start.



#### STRONGER COMMUNITIES

I was pleased to visit a local women's workshop that is carving a new path after receiving support from the Federal Government's Stronger Communities grant.

The Bellarine Women's Workshop recently received a \$2500 funding boost to help continue its valuable community work.

The registered charity aims to use craft and woodworking to break down social isolation and improve the mental health of women on the Bellarine.

Bellarine Women's Workshop secretary Mel Rogers said the grant would allow the 18-month-old organisation to purchase tools to expand its wood craft program.




## **QUEENSCLIFF MUSIC FESTIVAL**


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
